
# AdvancED Visits

In addition, the Terra Nova will be administered to all students on February 25-28, 2013. This is the standardized tests that we are required to give to all of our students annually. It is imperative that students be in attendance to take the test! Please be sure that you are here every day that week to take the subtest that will be administered on each of those dates!

**T-Timed Test!** The Terra Nova is a timed test. So, pace yourself. Don't go so fast that you make careless mistakes, but don't go so slow that you run out of time!

**E-Eat!** Eat a healthy breakfast each morning before the test. Include protein-brain food!

**R-Read & Review!** Read each question carefully & make sure you understand it before answering. Review your answers.

**R-Rest!** Rest well each night before each test day! Get a good night's sleep!

**A-Arrive on time!** Students are not admitted into the testing rooms once testing has begun!

**N-Never give up!** If you aren't sure of an answer, narrow down your options by eliminating answers you know are not correct and then choose the choice that seems best to you of the options that are left.

**O-Optimistic Attitude!** Keep a positive attitude. Tell yourself, *I can do this!* Show what you know. Stay strong!

**V-Very important!** The Terra Nova is very important because your scores show your parents, teachers and administrators what you have learned in the past year. Vow to give it your best effort!

**A-Always check your work!** If you finish a section before time has been called, go back over your answers & check your work!



## Envisioning Tomorrows Educational Technology Needs Today

A joint survey by Speak Up, a National Research Project, in collaboration with Blackboard, Inc.; asked students, educators and parents to envision the ultimate school for today's 21st century learners. While students in all grades continued to voice strong support for personal laptops that they can use both in school and at home as a key part of their ultimate school, student interest in online learning, and specifically the use of online tools, continues to grow. Middle school students in grades 6-8 are primarily interested in online extra help to support a traditional class where they are struggling to grasp the content. Over 46% of students in grades 6-12 include online tools to help them with organization of class work and assignments in their ultimate school, and 41% would like tools to better communicate with their teachers. Additionally, educational leaders, at both school and district offices, indicated they appreciate the value of technology within a 21st century education. Over 88% say that the effective implementation of instructional technology is core to their mission, and 84% believe that technology use does indeed enhance student achievement.

In many ways, today's 6th graders are much more technology savvy and fluent with the emerging technologies than even their older siblings in high school. 47 percent are tapping into the transformative power of educational games within learning, both in school and out of school. Only 29 percent of their high school peers are doing the same. But what will 6th grade look like in 2015? Will today's emerging technologies such as mobile learning, online classes or e-textbooks be commonplace in our classrooms? What new, yet to be invented technology tools and services will those 6th grade students be adapting to meet their learning needs, far ahead of the inclusion of those tools by their teachers in the classroom? What will be the expectations of today's 6th graders for using these new technologies within learning in 2015 when they are in 9th grade? What unforeseen demands will they have in 2015 for their high school (and ultimately college and/or workplace) to ensure personal productivity and 24/7 learning?

For the past eight years, the Speak Up National Research Project has endeavored to stimulate new discussions around these kinds of questions and to provide a context to help education, parent, policy and business leaders think beyond today and envision tomorrow. As first described by Project Tomorrow (2010) in the report *"Creating our Future: Students Speak Up about their Vision for 21st Century Learning,"* today's students have their own vision for how technology should be used effectively within learning.
