SUBJECT: Fort Knox Policy Memo No. 45-06 – Installation Guidelines for the Safety and Well-Being of Children

1. Reference AR 608-18, The Army Family Advocacy Program, 30 May 2006.
2. The safety and well being of children in our military community is the responsibility of every adult member of this command. Our children should be given the opportunity to grow and learn in a safe atmosphere free of fear. Soldiers, civilians, and family members must be alert to any action or situation that endangers the security of minors.
3. Child abuse and neglect are significant threats to the physical and mental health of children and cannot be tolerated in this community.
  - a. Under the guidelines of the Family Advocacy Program (FAP), the Case Review Committee (CRC) is responsible for ensuring the allegations of abuse and neglect are investigated and, when necessary, appropriate treatment is provided to protect children from further harm.
  - b. The identification and treatment of child abuse or neglect are determined on an individual basis by the CRC. Situations may be child physical, sexual, or emotional abuse or child neglect as defined in AR 608-18.
4. Brigade, battalion, and company commanders and leaders at all levels are responsible for the safety of minor family members.
  - a. Commanders will ensure that Soldiers receive unit briefings on the FAP and timely counseling regarding legal and moral ramifications of abuse or neglect and make referrals, as appropriate. The FAP offers the Army Community Unit Trainers Course for unit representatives. The course offers updated information in the dynamics of child and spouse abuse, as well as all the resources available from ACS to help Soldiers and their families. 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b. The CRC will coordinate with commanders on child abuse cases involving Soldiers and families under their command.

c. Commanders will work with CRC and take whatever administrative measures are necessary to prevent further child abuse or neglect.

5. During the parental duty hours, primarily Monday-Friday, 0600-1800, there continues to be a high number of incidents regarding children being left unattended and unsupervised in housing areas, quarters, and post facilities. Due to this concern, the following policy guidelines and reference chart at the enclosure are established:

a. Children in Grades 5 and Younger.

(1) Children in grades 5 and younger require supervision. Such supervision may be provided by their parents, other adults, or in some instances, children who are at least 12 years of age. They will not be left unsupervised in quarters at any time, nor will they be left under the supervision of other children for extended periods. Parents are strongly encouraged to ensure the person providing the care has been trained in infant/child CPR, basic first aid, and proper care-giving techniques. The American Red Cross (624-2163) provides training for baby sitters providing care in the child's home.

(2) Vehicular Safety. Children in grades 5 and below will not be left unattended for any period in a vehicle. Kentucky law and Fort Knox requires that children fewer than 40 inches in height must be secured in a child's protective driving seat when riding in a privately-owned vehicle. It is also mandatory that all Soldiers and family members wear seat belts.

b. Children in Grades 6 and Older. Supervision of children in grades 6 and older will be based on their maturity. Children will not be allowed to damage or destroy personal or government property, garden plots, yards, or buildings. Invasions of privacy and acts of vandalism will not be condoned in quarters. Children 15 years and under will not be left alone overnight without adult supervision.

c. Post Facilities and Outside Areas. Post facilities (i.e., PX, commissary, library, craft shops, etc.) are intended to provide goods and services for a better quality of life for our Soldiers and families. Post facilities are not intended to become places for parents to leave children unattended and unsupervised for extended periods. Parents will ensure that children use post facilities only for legitimate purposes and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.

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d. Parent Responsibility. Parents remain responsible for ensuring their children arrive safely at school, particularly if they walk or bike to school. At all times, but especially during the summer months and school intercessions, parents will ensure the health and safety of their children by providing appropriate supervision in playground areas and outside. Playing in the streets is prohibited.

6. These guidelines are set in an effort to protect our children residing on post. Every Soldier, employee, and member of the military community should report information about known and suspected child abuse to the 24/7 Fort Knox Report Point of Contact, which is the military police (624-2111). Child and Youth Services (624-6703) is available to assist parents in finding suitable childcare. The military police will monitor compliance with these guidelines. For further information, contact one of the above-mentioned agencies.

7. Working on Fort Knox and residing in post quarters are privileges that also carry important responsibilities, including reporting suspected incidents of child abuse and neglect, as well as supervising and training our children to ensure their safety.

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## FORT KNOX CHILD/YOUTH SUPERVISION POLICY

This policy applies 24 hours a day, seven days a week to those who are assigned to, supported by, or are guests on Fort Knox. The care and supervision of children/youth is a parental responsibility. Supervision is a planned, consistent way to provide ongoing care for children/youth to include necessities of nourishment, sanitation, and well being. This policy is based on the grade of the child/youth in school. During summer children/youth are considered to be in the grade they just completed for the school year.
